

Are you making fun of me? Do you think I am a dog? Why are you sending a little boy out with his sling shot? Do you think that throwing rocks at me will make me go away?


> I represent the God of Israel whom you have been insulting. He will give me victory over you today, in front of all these soldiers to show that He is the strongest!




Read this story in 1 Samuel 16:4-13.


For help, read 1 Samuel 26:9-11.
